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# **GAME-CHANGER FOR MATSULU PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES**

In June 2018, the Masibambisane Centre for People with Disabilities, in Matsulu, became the recipients of a generous donation of a brand new brickmaking machine and accessories, a secure storage container and sewing machines from Silulumanzi. This donation is part of Silulumanzi's corporate social investment drive to plough back into communities by investing in projects that contribute to the improvement of the lives of those that are most vulnerable. The brickmaking machine and sewing machines will ensure that the 101 beneficiaries remain physically and mentally active whilst doing something that earns them money. Their loved ones will also benefit through the additional income generated by the sale of the products made by these special people.

The value of water must be appreciated and shared responsibly. Services rendered must be paid to ensure the long term financial stability of the municipality. ## **MANDELA DAY 2018** giving back

Mandela Day serves to remind each of us to reflect on whether we are living up to Madiba's remarkable legacy: The values of compassion, forgiveness, decency, love and respect for all people. At Silulumanzi, we are committed to helping improve the quality of life in the communities among which we live and work. This year we organised special activities to commemorate the day. Silulumanzi staff around the areas we serve, made a difference through a variety of activities namely: home visits to the elderly, food parcels donations, vegetable garden seed donations and planting seeds, sharing breakfast meals with the elderly, and cleaning up of the yards and testing and repairing water supply such as taps, toilets and geysers



In the City of Mbombela, employees paid a visit to 51 elderly citizens at the Oran-jezight Retirement Village. visit and treat for the elderly citizens, with some of them living on their own or alone, was supported by Shirley from Guardian Angels who played a key role in creating this memora ble day. The team spent time with the elderly citizens where breakfast packs and meals were shared, accompanied by stories told over

laughter & friendly banter. On the day prior to the visit our Non Revenue Water technical team identified and fixed water leaks in ten flats, as well as an elderly lady's geyser that has been broken for some time and who had to carry hot water daily from a neigbour

The second team of employees visited John Mdhluli Primary School in Mattafin village to support their inhouse project aimed and at developing their National School Nutri-tion Programme. This programme aims to foster better education by enhancing chil-dren's active learning capacity and alleviating short-term hunger, It provides an incentive for children to attend school regularly & punctually, as well as addressing certain micro-nutrient deficiencies. A donation of vegetable seeds was made by Sembcorp Silulumanzi to support the school to establish a vegetable garden. The team, assisted by John Mdhluli school learners, further helped to clean the school terrain.

In Matsulu the team took part in a great initiative of supporting the Directorate for Priority Crime Investigation's Hawks Unit in Mpumalanga, and municipal stakeholders in handing over a household structure for Ms. Nomthandazo Gamedze & her 7-yearold daughter. Their house burned down, leaving the family with nowhere to stay. The

It offers a shelter and counselling facility for abused women and children. The centre also provides soft skills such as handicrafts, hair care and life skills. A donation of vegetable seeds was given and we assisted in planting these. Silulumanzi staff also cleaned the whole yard, and installed a water pressure pump for the toilets and baths. The centre has previously struggled with the supply of water to fill their tanks weekly.

# WATER FACTS

An average household using 30 kl (thirty thousand litres) of water monthly, or about 1000 litres per day, the water bill will be R1006.94. This equates to only 3.4 cents per litre for drinking water delivered at your house, while many are prepared to pay up to R15 per litre for bottled water in the shops! Included in this bill is the taking away and treatment of wastewater if your house is connected to the sewer



system. All customers enjoy Free Basic Services as whereby the first 6000 liters per month is free.

Just 1 dripping tap in your house, dripping 60 drops per minute, equates to 21 liters per day or 7665 litres per year! 1000 leaking taps will leak 7 665 000 litres per year!....and we know there are many leaking taps, cisterns, irrigation systems out there...

With air temperature of 30C°, water temperature of 25 C°, a swimming pool of 8 x 4 m can loose 1 and 2 litres of water per hour! Use a pool cover to reduce losses by up to 97%

To ensure piped tap water remains safe to drink we sample and analyse the raw water; at each stage of the treatment process, as well an within the distribution system. Over 500 samples are analysed monthly in our laboratory. Water is tested for aesthetic, chemical and biological compliance. Sample results are also externally verified. If you receive piped water from Silulumanzi, it is safe to drink.
